## HISTORY

In the Spring of 2012, Save A Warrior™ (SAW) began with an idea that a breakthrough was desperately needed to save the lives of those who serve others. Since our beginning, this vital idea has saved more than a thousand lives, while touching millions\* more along the way. From California to Ohio, our alumni regard SAW as one of their life's most rewarding experiences.

Here are just a few examples highlighting the impact of SAW's thought leadership:

- In 2013, SAW serves a suicidal non-veteran first responder on the Los Angeles Police Department SWAT team struggling with Complex PTS comorbid with alcoholism
- In 2014, CNN's documentary The War Comes Home airs to nearly a million viewers

### *\*SAW'S IMPACT NUMBERS IN THE MILLIONS*

IT IS ESTIMATED THAT 135 SURVIVING INDIVIDUALS ARE AFFECTED BY A LOVED ONE'S SUICIDE (MENTALHEALTH.VA.GOV 2019). KNOWING THIS AS IT RELATES TO THE NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS SAW HAS ALREADY SERVED, ALONG WITH THE KNOWN VIEWERSHIP OF FEATURE AND DOCUMENTARY FILMS BASED ON OUR INNOVATIVE APPROACH TO HEALING, SAW'S HAS TOUCHED MILLIONS OF LIVES.

- In 2015, the feature documentary film Thank You For Your service is released
- In 2015, SAW receives the WebMD Health Heroes award for Veteran advocacy
- In 2017, SAW is declared a winner at the VA Braintrust: Pathways to InnoVation at Harvard Medical School for a novel and disruptive approach for preventing suicide
- In 2018, SAW is the recipient of the Eagle Rare Life award
- In 2018, operations commence at S/SGT Dick Wood Warrior Village in Newark, Ohio
- In 2019, the feature film The Last Full Measure premieres at Wright Patterson in Ohio

“Prior to attending Save A Warrior, I had lost my connection to everyone and everything. The trauma that I was carrying daily ran the show and I believed that living was much worse than death. Save A Warrior is the only program I have attended that provided solutions from start to finish for understanding my trauma and the impact it was having on my life. I learned how to rebuild and establish the connections I had lost and avoided. I am honest again, I pray again, I love again, I hope again, and I cry again. Yes, I still get triggered, but I honestly can say that once I begin to experience the “spiral” I am aware of my emotions and am better able to make decisions in those moments that no longer affect me negatively. I am grateful for ALL of my life and I carry that gratitude with me everywhere I go and in everything I do.

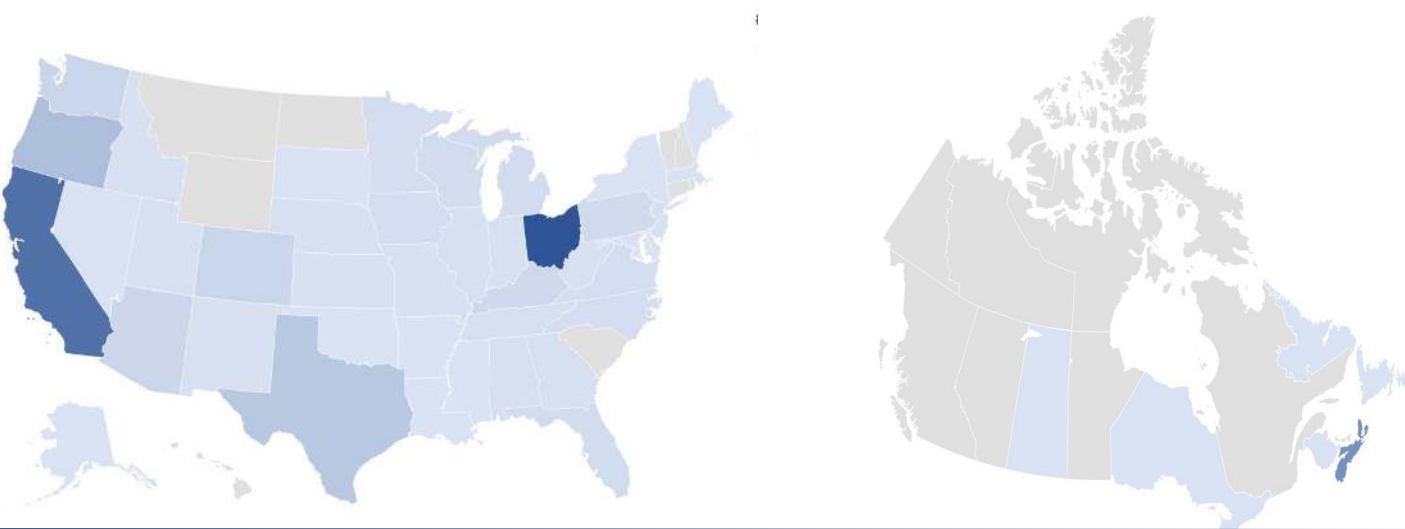




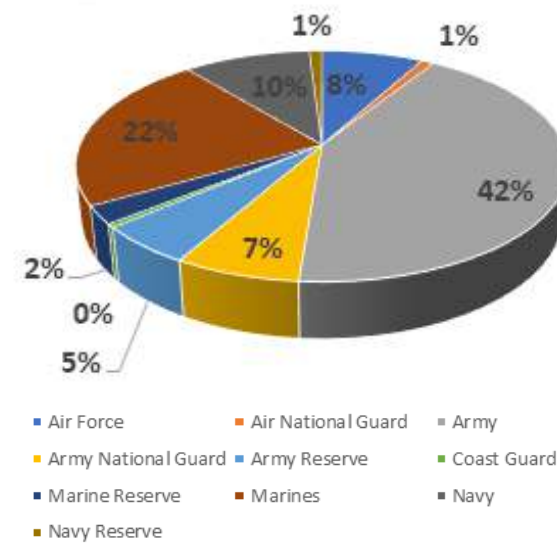
# IMPACT

2019 was a momentous year for Save A Warrior™ (SAW). Through the generous support of our stakeholders, SAW was able to:

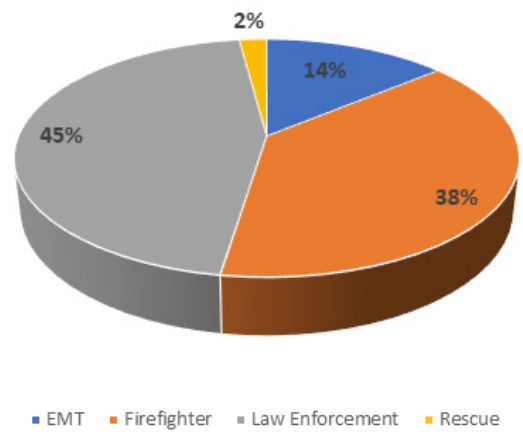
- Serve it's 1,000th warrior

**AVERAGE SCORE = 5.2**

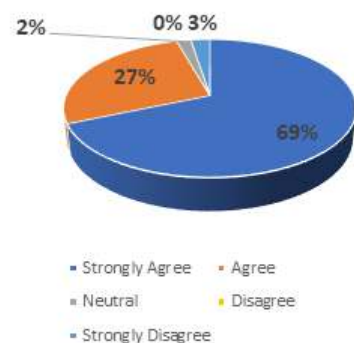
SAW is the only experiential program that directly deals with childhood trauma as a root causal affect, addressing “the thing beneath the thing.” Each participant takes the ACE assessment upon entering and leaving the program, leading to honest discussions about what is often at the core of suicidal thoughts, and the understanding that an ACEs score does not define who a person is or can become. The ability to process traumatic incidents in a safe surrounding can serve as a protective shield against many of the negative health and life outcomes caused by such adversity.

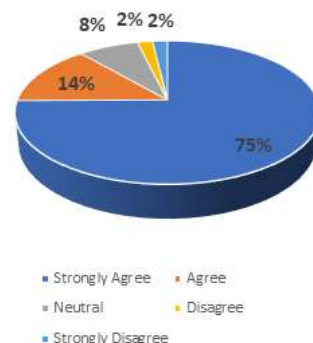

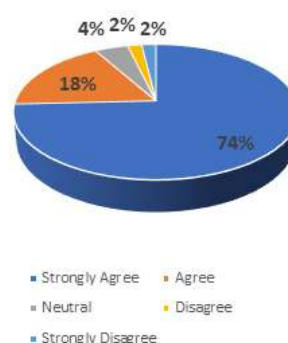

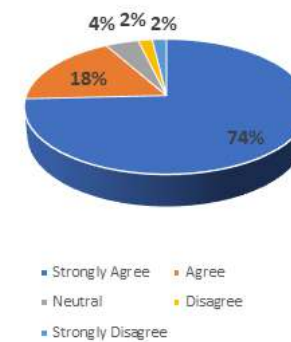

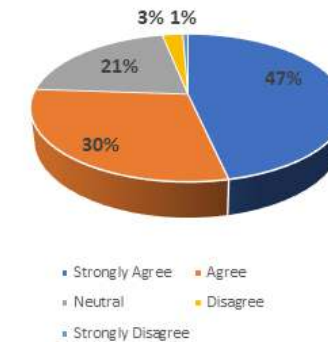

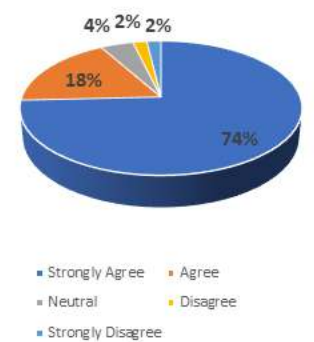

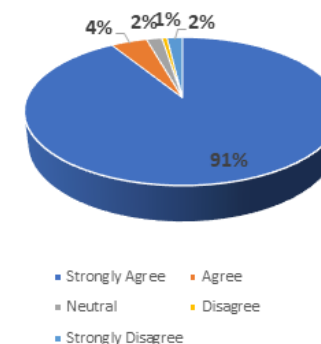

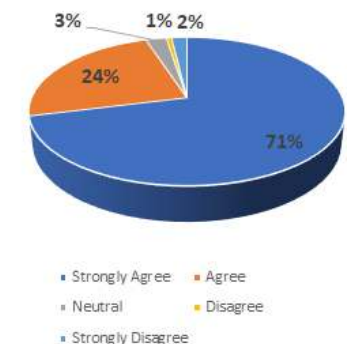

## WARRIOR SPOTLIGHT

### JENNIFER MALDONADO, COHORT 068

“

In Oct 2016 I heard about SAW and I thought it would be a good program for my husband. Steve had been struggling and our life was really on hold. For eight years my job was to keep him alive and make sure he did not have a substance abuse problem. When he completed the program as part of Cohort 050, Steve was more engaged and ready to live life to the fullest instead of going through the motions. He was ready to do things – but I wasn't. I didn't know what my job was anymore. I had been shielding Steve for all this time, but I had also been shielding myself from my childhood and military trauma. He encouraged me to go through the SAW program, and I figured that if he could go through it, I could too. It was scary to put myself out there as part of Cohort 068, but the women I met were from all facets – military, police – and they were just as scared as I was. SAW taught me to slow down, to listen, to speak up and advocate for myself, and to work together with other women instead of measuring myself against them. This year Steve and I celebrated our 19th wedding anniversary and I told him that this was the first year I did not have to worry that it would be our last. That's the power of SAW.

I was a typical macho man before I went to SAW. When I got out of the program, for the first time I developed heart-to-heart, loving, accountable relationships with other men without any negative stigma. There is a difference in the calmness you learn at SAW, and what that does for your mental, physical and spiritual wellness I see that same difference in Jennifer. We are not just surviving, we are living. SAW has done so much for us and our family.”

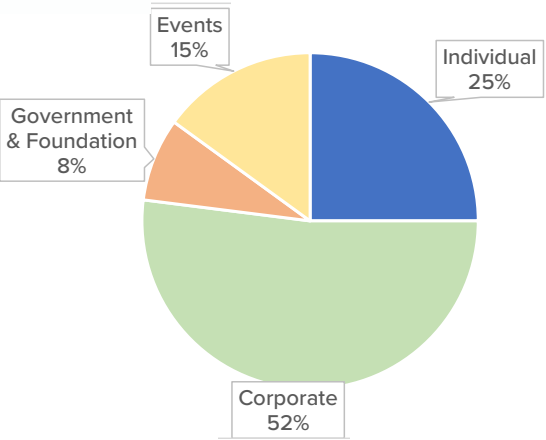

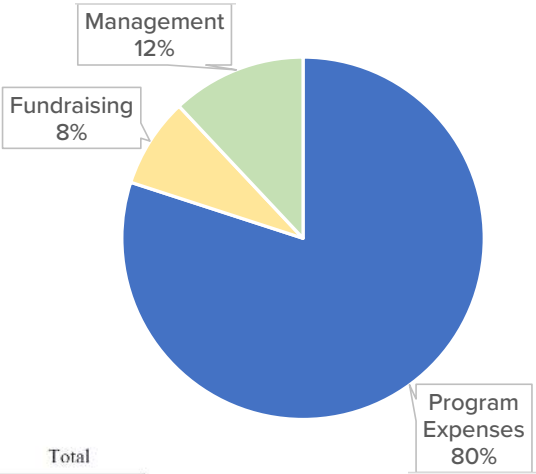

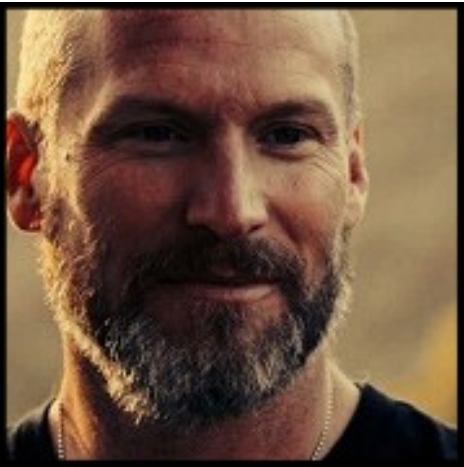
